Harvesting Your Cocoons

Why Should I Harvest

- What's in your yard?
 - Good
 - Bad
 - Ugly
- What do you want in your yard next year?
- Count + or -
 - Fostering
 - Give away
 - Different locations

What You Should Have

- Paper for keeping it clean
- Container for cocoons
- Disposal container for debris
- Cutting tool (tubes)
- Scraper (wood inserts)
- A plan for cleaning
- A plan and place for storage (or setting out)

Observation is Key

- For straws
 - Holes in sides
 - Empty tubes
- Plug ends
 - Different types
 - Holes or broken mud
 - Different colors
- No plug-could have cocoons



Getting Down to Business

- Tear apart tubes/Straws
 - Look down the hole
 - Put aside empties
- Carefully cut crease
- Peal straw/tear apart tube
- Reeds and other tubes
- OBSERVE



Wooden Inserts

- Remove band
- Save cardboard backing
- Start with top layer
- Cocoons could be on top or bottom of layer
- Use "scraper" to gently remove cocoons
- OBSERVE

What Do You See?

- Plug color, texture
- Vestibule air pocket
- Mud Dividers
- Cocoons
 - Type
 - Boys in front girls in back
 - Poop (that's the black stuff)
- Other Stuff
 - Parasites
 - Different dividers
 - Chalk brood
 - Quandaries



Some of What We Found



Undesirables

- Parasitic Wasps
- Blossom mites
- Chalk Brood
 - Special handling
 - Can contaminate
- Houdini Fly
- Others?











Cleaning

- Why we do it
 - Remove undesirables
 - Prepare for storage
- How we do it
 - Sand method
 - Clorox and water
- Live bees inside the cocoons
- Lucky you you have a handout

Storage

- Why store
 - Controlled environment
 - Release when needed (until last of April)
 - Safe from predators
- When should you store
- Where do you store
- How to store
